9:00pm Dolley Madison: American Experience

Style icon, extravagant hostess, humanitarian, doting mother, trusted political advisor, and diplomat. These are the roles we now expect in a First Lady, roles created by President James Madison's wife, Dolley. Born in relative obscurity before the American Revolution, Dolley's beauty attracted attention, but it was her political acumen that set her apart in a time when women held no overt political power. As the "first First Lady," she used her unelected position to legitimize the nation's new capital, to create a political and social style for the new country and to give Americans a sense of their own national identity. As her successors have gone on to do ever since, Dolley Madison adopted social causes of her own, including advocating for children left orphaned by the War of 1812. This portrait features Tony Award-nominee Eve Best (Nurse Jackie) as Dolley Madison and Tony Award-winner Jefferson Mays as James Madison.

10:30pm Morristown: Where America Survived

This program revisits the "hard winter" of 1779-80, when General George Washington's troops arrived at the densely wooded area just south of Morristown, known as Jockey Hollow, to build a log hut city for their winter camp. The film is an eye-opening look at how the camp saved the army and the American Revolution -- from the brink of disaster. Based on John T. Host Kevin O'Connor finds carpenter Zo Curet in the front parlor installing a plaster crown molding. This close reproduction of the 1870s original is a lightweight foam made with plaster and an acrylic coating which can easily be installed with nothing more than a joint compound. Homeowner Lanita Tolentino shows Kevin the colors she's considering as painting contractor Ivan Batallas paints an accent wall in the back bedroom. Master carpenter Norm Abram visits a workshop to see how the slabs for our new eight-foot oak front doors and sidelights are machined and pre-hung for installation as one large unit on the jobsite. Two miles down the road, Kevin visits an architectural antiques shop to find a matching marble fireplace surround for the second unit of our house. Shop owner Bill Raymer shows Kevin around and offers to donate a closely matching fireplace to the project. Back at the house, the new front doors have arrived, and lead carpenter Colin Paterson makes quick work of installing them. In the second half of the hour, on Ask This Old House, landscape contractor Roger Cook helps a homeowner revive a damaged lawn. Then Roger, along with Kevin O'Connor, plumbing and heating expert Richard Trethewey, and general contractor Tom Silva ask, "What is it?" Afterward, Richard helps a homeowner fix a clogged kitchen sink drain.

One of the rarest and most sought-after performance films from its time, the 1964 concert event featured future Rock and Roll Hall of Famers James Brown, Chuck Berry, The Beach Boys, Marvin Gaye, Smokey Robinson & The Miracles, The Supremes and many other American and British Invasion hit-makers in their prime. This legendary film hasn't been seen in its entirety since it originally appeared in theaters in 1964. Mastered from a new High Definition transfer, this version features the Beach Boys' performances that were removed following the film's initial theatrical run.

Now a giant international figure in his field with such works as the John F. Kennedy Library, the east wing of the National Gallery, the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and the Pyramid at the Louvre on his resume, I.M. Pei left China as a young student in the 1930s, and was taught abstract modern architecture at Harvard. It was the antithesis of his "impossible dream" to bring nature to his work, to join modern and tradition into a harmonious whole -- evocative of growing up in his grandfather's gardens in Suzhou. Many decades and many worlds later, and now in his early 90s, Pei was invited to design a modern museum to house the antiquities of Suzhou.

This is also the story about the teenage athletes fighting their way out of the poverty and desolation that surrounds them, armed with little more than a basketball and the hard wisdom of a fierce, demanding coach. Hurley's unmatched success on the court is trumped only by his ability to get these vulnerable kids out of the projects and Jersey City. All but two of the hundreds of players he's coached went on to college.
