Host Kevin O'Connor and master carpenter Norm Abram take a ride through the city of New Orleans with streetcar driver Sue Daniel, who is known locally as "Streetcar Sue." At the project house in Holy Cross, Norm catches up with homeowner Rashida Ferdinand's new general contractor Larry Schneider to see the amazing progress he has made in just two short weeks on the job. At Musicians' Village, saxophonist Calvin Johnson shows Norm how he is investing sweat equity toward the 350 hours required to become a homeowner in the neighborhood. Back at the project house, lead carpenter Mike Gettle shows Kevin how he is trimming the side porch. In Central City, Kevin meets Mercy Corps program director Rick Denhart to learn how the non-profit organization helps homeowners in New Orleans deconstruct their ruined properties at no cost. The salvaged materials are given to local depots where they are sold at a reduced price. The last stop in the process is the Green Project in St. Roch where the goods are bought and sold by members of the community.

Huell visits a massive archeological site with millions of fossils dating from the Miocene Epoch, 15 million years ago. Kern County was once at the bottom of a huge sea filled with massive prehistoric sharks called megalodons which were as big as city busses and fed on whales. Sharktooth Hill is literally covered with fossilized shark teeth. Huell also visits the Buena Vista Museum, which houses amazing archeological finds recovered from Sharktooth Hill. The Buena Vista Museum of Natural History is located in the heart of downtown Bakersfield. It houses an impressive display of fossils from the Miocene Epoch which was 14 -16 million years ago. The fossils were found in the foothills northeast of Bakersfield, known as the Sharktooth Hill area. Kern County is home to over 100 square miles of fossil beds from the Miocene Epoch. Shangri-la is a 40-minute dance special featuring the Dynamic Hunan Dance Company and Liping Yang, China's foremost dancer and choreographer. While most westerners think of China as a fairly homogeneous country with a common language and culture, the facts are quite different. China is wonderfully diverse in ethnic and cultural terms. Shangri-la is a dance program taped in high definition in Kuoming, Hu Nan Province in South Central China, in May of 2007. In 1998 Liping Yang decided to create a dance piece that would showcase the diversity of cultural traditions of China as well as the native costumes and dance traditions of some of China's "minority groups" from various regions. The result was a two-hour program featuring over 50 native dancers from these diverse areas of China. Since then, Shangri-la has won national and international acclaim as a powerful and entertaining work that blends multiple Chinese cultural traditions with contemporary choreography and music. After performing triumphantly in Beijing's national theatre in 2000, the company has toured every major city in China as well as many places abroad, including Paris, Moscow, Amsterdam, Tokyo and St. Louis in the United States. The work explores China's past through several pieces in which drums and native dancers harken back to ancient times when man struggled to survive and triumph over the elements. Nature's bounty, women's multiple roles, love and the search for spiritual meaning, round out the themes of the piece. The music for this work was especially composed by China's premiere classical and pop composer, San Bao. Liping Yang, is both artistic director and prima ballerina. She is renowned for her performance of China's most traditional "peacock" dances as well as for her daring and energetic contemporary choreography.

Deep Jungle - Monsters of the Forest

If a nutshell is too hard to be cracked, how can it be indispensable to the existence of untold numbers of living things? That's one of the intriguing mysteries of rainforest ecology tackled in the second hour. Highlights: With the aid of state-of-the-art graphics, Deep Jungle imparts an understanding of the complex ecologies centered around the giant trees of the rainforest. Focusing on a section of jungle in Peru, the film explores the life history of a giant Brazil nut tree and the debt it owes to a forgetful rodent - and also perhaps to the Spanish conquistadors. British tarantula expert Martin Nicholas comes to the same Peruvian jungle, prompted by a local legend describing a spider so big and fearsome that it eats chickens. What he finds is that the stuff of legends is sometimes true. "Spider Man" also treats viewers to an ultra close-up look at the world's most deadly known spider - and it's not the one that eats chickens. Roundly attacked by bees and wasps, researcher David Roubik considers the ordeal more than worth it as he searches for a pivotal creature in the ecology of the Peruvian jungle: the bees that pollinate the Brazil nut tree and a rare orchid. The male bees collect the oily perfume from the orchid and use it to attract a mate. Without the perfume, the bees would never mate and would disappear, and the whole of the Brazil nut world would fall apart. The film shows that much of the rainfall in a rainforest is generated in part by the trees themselves, illustrating that even animals that live in rivers or flooded areas miles away from the dense forestry trees are dependent on the heart of the jungle.

News from Nature - Vineyards in Spain have survived bombs, wars and plagues, but now they are facing their most life-threatening opponent yet - climate change. Wine connoisseurs can still enjoy a fine glass of Spanish wine, but the reality that some vintages may become increasingly rare or even nonexistent will be harder to swallow.

Currently the largest producer of grapes in Europe, Spain will soon be competing with non-traditional wine producers in the North, such as England and Germany, where the increased temperatures have benefited the grape harvest. Crittercam(r) - Turtle eggs have long been prized as an aphrodisiac and turtle meat as a meal. Illegal egg harvesting and adult turtle poaching in Bahia De Los Angeles, Mexico, has contributed to a drop in the black turtle population to one percent of its norm. Marine biologist Jeff Seminoff uses Crittercam(r) to find the best ways to protect this dying breed of turtle. GeoCast - A paleo- anthropologist contemplates his personal understanding of normal human variation after finding unusual fossil remains in Micronesia. The findings, which show an incredible range of humans in size and shape, could date back more than three thousand years and shed new light on human origins. In Kenya, Rothschild giraffes begin to walk away from the brink of extinction with the help of a local family that has taken in seven of these elegant creatures. Hoping to introduce the two youngest females to suitable mates, the family embarks on the difficult and dangerous task of moving the giraffes to a protected park 80 miles away. The only remaining monument of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World, the Pyramids of Giza leave people in awe. The sparkling treasures and artifacts of past pharaohs are well documented, but little is known about

the average Egyptians who made these wonders possible. Led by National Geographic Explorer-in-Residence Zahi Hawass, a team of archeologists explores the remains of an ancient working-class village to learn more about the every day lives of the laborers who built history. There comes a time when we all must make a leap into adulthood and for great gray owl chicks in Yellowstone National Park, the expression is taken quite literally! Practice-makes-perfect for the little owl chicks as they hesitantly practice flying from their nests only to scramble back up the tree to try again.
